Once Mary, bearing in Her womb an Offspring conceived without seed, was registered in Bethlehem with the elder Joseph, as being of the seed of David. And while they were there, the days were accomplished that She should be delivered. There was no room for them in the inn, but the cave showed itself to be a beauteous palace for the Queen, and Christ is born to raise up the image that fell of old! (Troparion of the Forefeast of the Nativity of Christ)

Most years we celebrate the Nativity of our Lord with great fanfare and triumph. This is fitting and good, as it is one of the great feasts of the Holy Church, and one for which we prepare with Lent.

And the killing of the 14,000 Innocents adds a tinge of sadness to the great feast.

However, this does not negate our celebration. Metropolitan Anthony (Khrapovitsky) wrote that the feast of Nativity is an exhibition of God's love for mankind.

May the feast of the Nativity of our Lord be for all of you a great triumph of love! May it be an awakening in our hearts of what is most important. May it be an example to those around us of our love for God, and His love for us.
